**Prayer Letter and Mission Update** 

September 2022

### **Brothers and Sisters in Christ.**

This Summer has been busy but fulfilling. I have traveled all over the Midwest visiting churches, attending conferences, seeing family, and preparing for my move to Tanzania

This month, I am temporarily moving to central Michigan to continue speaking to congregations about my mission with Lutheran Bible Translators (LBT) and how they can help. In between speaking engagements, I continue to do the myriad of small things to prepare for my departure like getting recommended immunizations, arranging for a POA, organizing documents for my resident permit, and getting an international driver's license.

- 1. Language and Culture Learning Classes begin on November 4th, and I'd like a couple weeks prior to that to settle in. Few people speak English, so language school is a first stop for a strong start. If I can't make it by November, the next available class begins on February 4<sup>th</sup> –an entire 5 months from now!
- 2. The partners in the SELVD are ready for me to arrive. They have been preparing for this project for a long time and are finally seeing it come together. I am also ready to go and was inspired by their excitement and vision for work among the Datooga.

Together, I believe we can get me to Tanzania. I know many people who have my back and are as excited as I am to go on this journey. I'm comforted by Philippians 1:6, when Paul says that "He who has begun a good work in you will see it through to completion." I cannot do this on my own, but since God put this mission on my heart, I believe He will see it through by using partners like you. Let's see it done!

#### A Word from Tiffany's Supervisor

My name is Sarah Esala, and I've been with LBT for 20 years. Last winter as I was thinking about the Datooga project, I had concerns as to how LBT would be able to adequately support this translation project. Even though we have a strong partner with the Lutheran Church in that area, translation work requires a lot of specialized training and support, and our partner is not familiar with the process. The early stages are SO important yet so difficult—I wanted a good start.

And then Tiffany shared that she was feeling called to do Scripture Engagement and Community work—a perfect fit and answer to my prayers. When we traveled together to Tanzania this summer, she practiced the little Swahili she knew and had a posture towards learning and listening. I think she's going to be fantastic at supporting this work and bridging the unknowns.

I also think it's going to be very challenging for her. Your prayers are vital for her support. Would you consider adding her to your weekly prayers at church or Bible study? Could you put her name near the sink where you brush your teeth, so you remember to pray for her often? Tiffany is your ambassador for the Gospel to the Datooga. She takes this very seriously, and my prayer is that you will support her on this journey in every way the Spirit leads
