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Dear Friends,

Our vehicle rolled to a stop. Which way should we go? Technically, we were on a road, but without gravel or pavement or really anything "road-like," the way forward wasn't clear nor smooth, and there certainly was no sign pointing us to Lukale where we were heading. The surrounding landscape was akin to the setting of a Wild West movie set—flat, dry, and sandy with scrubby trees and grasses. There were no buildings along the way and few signs of life except for an occasional herd of cattle or goats with a Datooga shepherd looking after them.

I was with partners from the Lutheran Church of Tanzania exploring the area where we hope to initiate Bible translation work in 2023. Unlike some of our other projects, where a strong Christian presence has been established already, there are few Datooga Christians, and as we plan this project, I have the feeling that the road ahead of us will require careful navigation.

Bible translation is more than just "word A=word B." It's important for Bible translators to reach into the cultural background, the context, and religious traditions to discover appropriate word choice and meaning. The Datooga live quite differently than even many other Tanzanian groups so careful attention to these parts of life will be important. They are pastoralists (aka—shepherds like Abraham and Jacob from the Bible) who historically have wandered throughout parts of Tanzania and Kenya looking for good grazing for their herds. As a result of this lifestyle, they haven't settled together in towns nor gained education or exposure to other ways of doing life. Their traditions and language are strongly intact, but they are also struggling as their traditional way of life becomes less sustainable. I'm anticipating that some of the "ideal" ways of doing Bible translation will be difficult, requiring patience and discernment.

Join me in praising God for this opportunity for LBT to work with the Lutheran Church of Tanzania as they reach out to the Datooga and for the many people (including you!) who are partnering so that every person can hear the Good Shepherd's voice in a language they understand. I can't wait for the Datooga to hear that voice too and to experience how Jesus has come so they may have life and have it to the full (John 10:10 NIV).
