# **Ending the School Year**

From January to June there were many events at Bingham Academy. Because I teach in the middle school and high school and coach sports at all levels, I get to attend most events. They included an international day, a middle school beach party, high school banquet, 8th grade dinner, an international sports tournament (with schools from X countries), awards ceremonies and more!

Our high school banquet includes a fancy catered dinner and a dance party for the final hour.

8th grade dinner is similar to high school banquet. As the homeroom teacher, I am tasked with planning this event. Most years, the dinner takes place at a nice restaurant close to downtown Addis, but since it's a dinner for hyper 13-year-olds who want to play loud games and have a good time, it was ruled to have it on campus. Luckily, Bingham is both a school and residential campus. I planned this event in a backyard space, and it became a beautiful evening garden party! The planning was time consuming, but the evening was worth it. We had steak bites and chicken, a photo booth, fun awards for each student, table vs. table games, and closed out the night with s'mores, a fire pit, and a dance party. A fellow teacher brought the s'mores in a suitcase all the way from England for this event!

The end of the year also brings many awards ceremonies. As an athletic director and a coach, I presented many sports awards. I also run our house events and presented the winning house with the trophy at the end of year chapel. 
Hannah also graduated! She's the oldest of the Federwitz kids that I lived with in Ghana.











# **Konso Bible Dedication**

A group of LBT office workers, a camera man, and a pastor from Hails Corner Church in Milwaukee came to Ethiopia to attend the Konso Bible Dedication back in February. The Konso language group is located in southern Ethiopia. LBT has several other translation projects in the southern region, so we flew there a few days before the dedication to visit some of the translation projects' offices.

Although it was nice to be outside of busy Addis, it was also nice to learn more about what LBT does in Ethiopia. I am often very busy at Bingham, so this was a great way to learn about the translation work happening in Ethiopia. We started by visiting the Southwest Synod Bible Translation Coordination Office where the coordinator, pictured here, showed us each of the 7 translation projects that are currently underway in the synod. He walked us through how many books or portions of the Bible are completed in each language. We visited 3 of the projects while we were in the area. All of them are in somewhat close proximity to each other, but their cultures and languages are quite unique!

Each day we visited a new language project and met the translation team. We started at the Zayse office. The road from Arba Minch to the 3 language projects is the same road but it's filled with goat, cattle, and human crossings and is quite the bumpy and swerving drive. Zayse is known for their banana production, so we received bananas at all the coffee ceremonies. The Zayse language has a completed New Testament, and they are making the final push to complete the Old Testament. The next day we visited Dhirayta, which is about 30 minutes past Zayse. Dhirayta also has a completed New Testament and is working to complete the Old Testament. They have a chart in their office detailing how many chapters and verses have been translated for each book. It also shows if the book has been drafted, team reviewed, community reviewed and so on.

The final place we visited was Konso. The community of Konso has a UNESCO World Heritage site because of their distinct building styles. During the church service on Sunday, the completed Konso Bible was dedicated and distributed. We ate lunch together with translators and others who assisted this project. While some people conducted interviews, I was able to visit a village and see their incredible structures.
