I've had a pretty eventful Summer here in Tanzania, which has included my parents visiting, a trip to Dar es Salaam and Mwanga, visits from my US colleagues, and - can't forget to mention - getting engaged!

I'll begin with work-related items... In June, I attended the annual Bible Translation Summit meeting in Dar es Salaam. This is a forum of Bible translation agencies around Tanzania and Kenya. We meet to share ideas and encouragement with one another, as well as what we do as organizations. We try to find areas in which we can collaborate and work together. I got to co-present a short update on what LBT is doing in Tanzania alongside my colleague, Mpoki. It was really fun getting to introduce three new people from our LBT-Tanzania team to the other Bible translation agencies. I have previously attended Summit meetings with Bishop Oscar Lema, but this year we also came with Mpoki, Rev. Timothy, and Rev. Frank Mdindi (our Taturu program coordinator).

In early July I traveled all the way to Mwanga, Tanzania to watch my friend and former colleague, Rev. Dr. Daniel Mono, be ordained as the new bishop of Mwanga Lutheran diocese. Although I couldn't find much time to speak to him at the celebration, I ended up seeing him a week later in Shinyanga because he came with his wife for the annual theological symposium. We shared some meals together and talked about the need for Scripture engagement and Bible translation in his diocese. It hits close to home for him (literally!) because Mwanga is where he was born and where his mother tongue is spoken. The Bible is currently being translated into that language by another organization, praise God! I am looking forward to seeing how his experience as our program manager in Shinyanga plays into his part as a bishop in Mwanga. This same week, some LBT colleagues of mine were visiting for our annual program planning for next year (picture below). Yes, I also can't believe we're already thinking about 2026! I had a productive and relaxing time with our visitors and especially enjoyed finally getting to drive them around in my new car!

Culture Corner: Engagements

Engagements have been on my mind lately, so let me tell you a little bit about engagement procedures in Tanzania! What's considered "traditional" or not varies from tribe to tribe, or region to region, but here are the most common components of an engagement:

First, the man is supposed to go with his father and uncles to negotiate a dowry with his future father-in-law. My father, as you could probably guess, did not require this of my fiancé. Once the dowry is agreed, the man and woman can have a small ceremony where a pastor (if they are Christian) blesses the ring and the couple. We had our ceremony at Steven's parent's house in Mwanza with family and friends.

During the ceremony, the woman (not the man!) kneels to receive the ring. This is because when you receive a gift in Tanzanian culture, it is polite to bow or kneel, in thanks. In some tribes women kneel all the way to the floor when receiving something. This is why I am kneeling in the picture above - I am receiving a very important gift!

It's been about 2 ½ years since I moved to Tanzania, and their visit could not have come at a better time! We laughed, cried, gasped in awe during our safari at elephants that came just a little too close to the car for our comfort, and spent most of our time just catching up and talking as family. I was relieved, but also not surprised at all that my parents get along very well with my new fiancé, Steven.

Steven and I became friends only a few months after I moved to Mwadui. We bonded over singing worship music and talking about culture, theology and family. I was amazed that only after a short time of knowing him, Steven became one of my favorite people who constantly surprised me with how alike we are. We come from different cultures and languages, and yet I somehow felt more understood by Steven than I had by most people from my own country. Long story short, we started dating a few months later, and the rest is history!

I look forward to updating you on our journey and my endeavors with LBT. With OBS beginning, the translation program continuing to develop, planning a wedding and just enduring the regular ups and downs of life, I'm sure this next chapter of my ministry in Tanzania is going to be pretty exciting!
